We have received approval to purchase a building near Southampton Airport – which will secure the future of our service and help us reach the people who need us most in the **fastest possible time**.

WU3A MEMBERS DROVE A BEETLE!

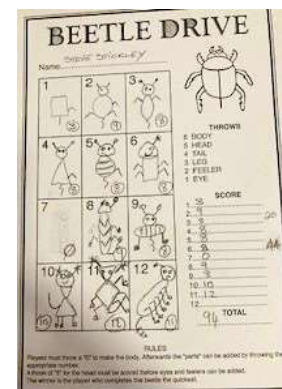
For what is becoming our annual Beetle Drive, 36 members had a fun afternoon at the Purbrook Centre on the 9th May.

SPEAKER'S CORNER - review of June's talk :

Speaker : Jackie Dimmock – 30 years with Hampshire Constabulary (part 2)

Despite suffering from a streaming cold, Jackie paid us a second visit to continue to regale us with tales from her 30 years in Hampshire Constabulary. Using her unique form of illustrating her talk with beautifully crafted appliques, she entertained an audience of 87.

After training, Jackie was based on the Isle of Wight and soon came to realise that planned free time was a thing of the past. Situations had to be dealt with immediately and often ran over way past the official end of the shift. Not good for the social life! Summoned to the mainland to patrol Longmoor Army camp with a group of police officers she found herself 'taken short' and needed a suitable bush or tree to use as modesty cover. However, whilst divesting herself the 'bush' spoke to her! A soldier on exercise was camouflaged within the undergrowth and advised her to find another place to use as a toilet!

After years on the IOW, she transferred to Basingstoke which was a far busier and challenging posting. There she was able to indulge her passion for forensic science. At the time fingerprint evidence was the main way to identify perpetrators. When DNA evidence came online to be able to be used in a criminal investigation, cold cases began to be solved and convictions obtained. A wide range of experts now help towards solving cases, including those who interpret blood spatter, pathologists and I.T. specialists.

After a maternity break, Jackie spent time in Portsmouth schools delivering a programme, initiated by the then Chief Constable, to educate and familiarise school children about the Police and their work in the community. At one school a girl asked if Jackie knew her dad to which she replied that she knew of him. Did you know he was shot asked the girl. "Yes / knew he'd been shot," Jackie replied. The girl's friend, who sat next to her in class, piped up, "Yes Miss it was my dad that shot him!"

These and many other stories of her working life in Hampshire Constabulary made for a second entertaining talk. Jackie will be back with us in September to give part 3, the final talk, in the series of her talks.

ARCHAEOLOGY WENT TO HENGISTBURY HEAD IN DORSET



Situated between Christchurch and Bournemouth, humans occupied the site from prehistoric times 12,500 years ago to the late Iron Age, providing a timeline of development from hunter gathers to the use of bows and arrows. Farming came next with the domestication of animals and growing crops such as an ancient form of wheat - emmer. Thirteen

Bronze Age barrows were situated on the headland. In the early Iron Age- 2150 as the area was rich in iron stone, iron smelting and forges enabled the production of stronger tools and weapons. In the latter part of the Iron Age, an important international port of trade developed.

STOP SCAMS – 159 SERVICE

Ringling 159 works in the same way as 101 for the Police or 111 for the NHS. It is an emergency hotline to report and check financial scams as they happen. Dialling 159 automatically connects you to your bank’s fraud prevention service.



Fraudsters steal £millions every day from ordinary people who are too polite to say “no”.

If someone calls you unprompted and asks for personal or financial information, stop and take a moment to think – even if they claim to be from an organisation you trust. Only criminals will put pressure on you to act quickly. It’s absolutely fine to say “no” and then contact the organisation through a route you know to be genuine.



If you get a call that seems off or you think someone is trying to trick you into handing over money or personal details – stop, hang up and call 159. It’s a safe and direct way to connect with your bank when you’re most at risk of being scammed.

Share this information with family and friends and help to stop the scammers.

COMPUTER HELP

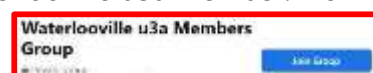
